Re: Lucy Faithfull Foundation Webinar

You may be aware of the review conducted by Ofsted nationally into peer-on-peer sexual abuse and harassment within schools, in light of some of the testimonials posted on the 'Everyone's Invited' website in March 2021.

Over the past year, Kelvin Hall School and the Thrive Trust have reviewed the procedures we have in place to tackle such incidents and to support the victims sensitively. However, as is always the case in the fast-moving context of safeguarding young people, there are things that we can learn from such reviews.

One area that we feel will be of real benefit to our young people and our community, is to support parents in developing an understanding of the context of the concerns raised by the report and what parents can do, along with school, to remain vigilant for signs of concern and to support young people who have experienced abuse or harassment.

Laura qualified as a probation officer in 2003, working in the West Midlands area. In 2007 she was seconded to a local charity to create a therapeutic group work programme for young men (aged 11 – 16 years) who had witnessed domestic abuse. The six month secondment developed into a 7 year project and she worked with over 250 boys and families, helping them to understand what healthy relationships look like and reduce their risk of becoming abusers in the future.

Next, Laura led a number of voluntary sector projects, including managing a young people's counselling and wellbeing service, an anti-poverty charity and developing a network of cancer support hubs across the West Midlands. She also set up her own training and consultancy business, training teachers, social workers and police officers in protective behaviours, safeguarding and family therapy.

Laura now leads LFF's multidisciplinary Schools team, who have expertise in assessing and working with young people displaying harmful sexual behaviour. She is working with researchers from the University of Surrey to gather evidence of what works to help schools respond to and prevent harmful sexual behaviour and the learning from this work will be shared with all schools across the UK.
